PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Reports are out today. These are an important part of the school year, with the teachers taking a lot of time to test, assess, reflect and then put into words, comments that best fit your child at this present point in time. The goal here is to work together to help your child along their learning path. The children's attendance at the interview is up to you; some people like to have the child present, to be part of the discussion; others like to have a

more adult conversation without the child present. Finally, a big thank you to the staff who have put in a lot of extra hours to get these documents completed.

CLASSROOM KORERO-Junior Room

Bula everyone! During the last four weeks our class has been studying a small, remote island off Fiji.

First, the children completed their passports and packed their bags for our imaginary flight. Ollie and Charles were our capable pilots, Freida and Elise our lovely air hostesses.

We have studied their food, clothing, housing, as well as customs and traditions. All the time we have been comparing their way of life with ours. We have enjoyed making flags, illustrations, place mats, we pretended to fire walk (walk on hot rocks) and participate in a kava ceremony, and in the final week, on Wednesday 4th July, the children will dress up for our Fijian meal at 12 o'clock. (A note will be going home with the children about this.)

Mr Starkey included looking at the repeating patterns on a turtle shell for the children to then design their own turtle shell pattern.

HELP! A MESSAGE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

We have a ferret problem in the forest!

DOC biodiversity rangers are in hot pursuit of ferrets which are hunting North Island brown kiwi in the Tongariro Forest. At least 10 Kiwi have been killed by ferrets since early March, and DOC has put extra resources into catching these predators. Disappointingly, a recent routine check of a key ferret trapping site showed a number of traps had been stolen, damaged or thrown over bank! Tongariro Operations Manager Bhrent Guy says DOC needs people to help catch these ferrets, and the best way to do that is to leave the traps in their strategic locations. He said rangers were shocked and dismayed when they found the traps broken and tossed aside. If you are keen to help save the kiwi in Tongariro Forest, please email sfaire@doc.govt.nz.
