# **CLASSROOM KORERO - Juniors**

We had a change of plans last week when Mrs Summers had to take her husband up to Waikato Hospital and we had the wonderful Mr Mills in the classroom. He did a neat project around geometric shapes, construction a Christmas tree out of an old wooden pallet and making decorations for it. You will get a chance to see the tree when we use it on our Christmas float in Saturday's Christmas Parade. On Friday when many of the older children were at the inter-school touch tournament, the juniors had a great lesson on foreground, midground and background in art, when they painted Armistice Day poppies in a field. This work is being put on display in the corridor. Yesterday we had a science lesson on air; looking at hovercrafts then using balloons to explore properties of air, before putting some balloons under an upside-down table then seeing how many children it could hold before they popped.
