PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

We are really pleased to have almost everyone back at school this week after a week of absences due mainly to covid last week.

Our classroom programmes are quite full. The teachers have their core subjects of reading, writing and maths well established. We also have daily class swimming lessons, daily small group focussed swimming lessons with Tina for some, the senior class has started ukulele / guitar / singing lessons with Jessie, Ewan and Kate on Monday afternoons; the middle room are having music lessons with Kate on Thursday afternoons. Our House of Science lessons have also commenced, with the current area of study being a physics-based unit on rocketry, where the students make and investigate a variety

of rockets to explore lift, thrust, weight and drag and their effect on rocket flight. There is some great, fun learning going on.

CLASSROOM KORERO Senior Room

In the senior room, we are into the swing of things now with our literacy and maths programmes. At this stage, we are sending home weekly spelling lists and reading for each student. They can log their learning in their homework notebooks themselves, but we do encourage whānau to check in with their tamariki and see what they are learning at home/school.

It was an exciting afternoon on Friday when we launched into our latest science topic; rockets! We began the lesson by collating what we already know about rockets and deciding what we want to know about rockets so that we could work out our next learning steps. We began by learning that a force is a push or pull upon an object resulting from the object's interaction with another object. Our first activity was an exploration of the role force, specifically, thrust plays in flying a rocket. Students then experimented with the role of weight, lift and drag by creating their own rockets. The "super serious science goggles" made us feel like real scientists!

A reminder that students are expected to have their togs at school every day for swimming lessons please. We are noticing large numbers of students 'forgetting' their togs. This can be disruptive to the class/lesson. We have clothes lines at school so these can be dried at school and left on their hooks overnight if needed. If students cannot swim due to personal or medical reasons, please contact the teacher or send a note every day that this occurs. Thank you.
