PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE Achievement Targets 2024

At last week's board meeting, the board approved our two achievement targets. Over the next two weeks I will write about these. The first is an Attendance Target.

We are concerned at the number of students who are not regularly attending school, as research has shown that poor attendance is the greatest factor in poor academic results.

Regularly attending school is defined as being at school for 90%+.

Ōwhango School's statistics for the second half of 2023 are:

Our goal, which aligns with the Government's Attendance and Engagement Strategy, is to lift our attendance as shown below:

To implement this goal, every five weeks I will be analysing our attendance figures and contacting parents whose child's attendance is causing concern. It is not that we want sick children to be at school, however, we need to balance up our accountability towards your child's learning and the consequences of having children missing out on large chunks of their education.

Thank you for joining us in Tōtara for our assembly last week, it was a pleasure to have so many whānau members visit our new learning space. Since then, we have continued to work on our mythical creature's topic by independently writing informative reports on our chosen creatures. We added a labelled diagram to our reports too.
