CLASSROOM KŌRERO - Kōwhai

It's all about nga puia (volcanoes) in Kōwhai at the moment. We are doing an integrated unit on volcanoes that incorporates science, te ao Māori, Aotearoa New Zealand histories, reading, writing, maths (statistics), social studies, technology and visual arts. It all started with some curious questions about te maunga we will soon be skiing on and has erupted (pun intended) into a wonderful world of learning.

In science, we used an orange (the Earth's mantle), orange peel (Earth's crust) and strawberry jam (magma) to model how tectonic plates converge or come together to form openings in the Earth's crust. We used crackers and berry sauce to visualise how pressure from the tectonic plates (crackers) coming together forces the magma (berry sauce) to come to the Earth's surface. Jackson and Connor took over as kaiako last week by bringing in their own model volcanoes and using vinegar and baking soda to mimic a volcanic eruption. This caused lots of excitement...and mess! Some tamariki were unsure what ash was. Blake said it was "like a powder that's left after something burns". Whaea Kim then brought in a jar of volcanic ash from the 2012 Tongariro eruption which fascinated our wee scientists.

Through te ao and te reo Māori and A.N.Z. histories, we have been using purakau (legends) like 'Battle of the Mountains' to connect to the turangawaewae (place and identity) of our tamariki, learning that stories of local maunga are significant to tangata whenua. We have been working on the pronunciation of local maunga names like Pihanga, Ruapehu, Ngauruhoe and Tongariro.

In recent weeks, we have been learning how to structure narratives in writing. Students have been busy crafting fairytales and adventure stories with a clear beginning, middle and end. This week they have been using their prior knowledge of sentence building and their newly acquired scientific vocabulary to craft texts that feature volcanoes. Our final project in our volcano study will be to revisit report writing and each student will plan and prepare an informational pamphlet about volcanoes. In the meantime, check out these exciting tales:

School Trip Goes Horribly Wrong! By Quinn Hunt

Jason, Eric and Quinn were going to high school. They were excited for the school trip. They climbed into a helicopter for the trip to Obsidian Land. The three kids fell out of the helicopter! They landed on Obsidian Land. Eric nearly fell into the hottest lava. The teacher saved him, and they went home safely.

The Bush Explorer By Corbin Wind

A bush explorer went to see Pihanga, the active volcano. He was looking for diamonds. So many grey rocks were floating in the air. The volcano was erupting. The bush explorer got rescued by a giant fish. He rode on her back to safety. The end.

Taranaki and Pihanga By Sheeran Leach

Taranaki and Pihanga are volcanoes. They are good friends. Next, they both have ash clouds come out of their craters. Ben and I saw them erupting. We felt excited. We ran very fast! We climbed a high ladder into space. We were safe from the volcanoes. The end.

The Ruapehu Rescue By Indiana Closter

Once there were two girls. One was a scientist, and the other was her friend Indie. They went for a hike up Ruapehu. It erupted with their friend Janey on it! Indie had a great idea, but the lava was running down fast from the crater. They got Janey down quickly. Then Molly the scientist called a helicopter. It brought them back to Ōwhango. They were happy to get rescued but mostly excited to see a volcano erupt! The end.

In maths, we began our statistics unit learning about sorting and classifying. We used a human continuum to show how Kōwhai students can be sorted into different categories. This made it a little easier to classify animals and toys. This week, we are tying our volcano mahi into our statistics work by gathering, displaying and analysing data about students' preferred maunga from our book 'Battle of the Mountains'.

As a technology challenge, nga tamariki have been set the task this week of designing and building a life-like, Lego model of a volcano. They have to consider realistic shapes, colours and features of a volcano.

As our senior friends skied last Friday, we had a relaxing afternoon of art. We drew, painted and decorated multimedia volcanoes using card, paint, pastels, and wool. We think they look pretty lit! I lava good pun!

By the time you receive this email, we will have finished our Keeping Ourselves Safe program in collaboration with local police constable Peter Marks. Students have been engaged in some very thoughtful korero about how they can protect themselves in a number of unsafe scenarios. We have done this through picture books, videos and real-life anecdotes. Key takeaways included knowing their address or phone number in case of emergencies (please keep supporting them with this), understanding bodily autonomy and what unsafe touch is, the difference between good surprises and bad secrets, and thinking about who their trusted adults are. Thank you, Constable Marks, for supporting us with this very important health and safety learning.

All participated in the morning lessons, with the instructors being really sensitive to the needs of the kids and coming inside to warm up as needed. A few went out for the afternoon lesson and got one on one instruction. Congratulations to Ivy and Hinemoa who stayed in their lessons to the very end, amazing perseverance!

A day like that is okay for one trip, but we will not be doing that again this year. I have negotiated with Whakapapa so that if the forecast is looking bad again, I will be able to cancel the day, so long as start this process three days out. I cannot just cancel on the morning of the trip as they must let their instructors know to reorganise their schedules.

DUFFY ROLE MODEL VISIT- DIANA QUEENIN

On Wednesday next week (20th August) at 9:30, we will be having a Duffy Role Model assembly. Our role model is Diana Queening.



Diana Queenin

A veteran Role Model for Duffy Books, Diana has travelled the world, living for extended periods of time in Melbourne, New York and Los Angeles (as well as Auckland and Wellington). While in New York she worked as a guide in the Museum of Natural History specialising in Dinosaurs and Ocean Life. A highlight of her career was attending the opening of 'Te Maori' at the Metropolitan Museum of Art when the exhibition went to New York. In Los Angeles she attended UCLA University and studied Bio Geography (the effect of nature on the land) and spent time in the American deserts among the cactus and snakes. Diana is a certified Scuba Diver and has dived in the Caribbean, the Red Sea, and Thailand and learned much about the underwater world. She joined Project Jonah on her return to New Zealand and is very interested in Whales and Dolphins (as well as monarch butterflies, plants, fishing, insects, birds, and reading lots of books!)

AUTHOR / ILLUSTRATOR VISIT – DONOVAN BIXLEY

Earlier this year, Kowhai students were using the Maui books of Donovan Bixley to inspire their writing and art tasks. They loved his cheeky retelling of the classic purakau and appealing illustrations. They asked if he could come to school so we wrote to him, and he replied, and is coming on September the 10th!

Donovan Bixley has written 100 books and illustrated over 120. He is looking forward to sharing his writing processes, his books, his inspiration and his illustrations with our tamariki.

Every class will have a session with Donovan but in the afternoon, he will be running an illustrator's workshop for our budding artists. This is an incredible opportunity to learn some amazing new artistic skills from an expert!

This workshop is limited to a small number of students. To make it fair in choosing who can attend, we are running a school-wide art competition for those interested. Students must create a unique/original character and submit it by the 28th of August to Whaea Siobhan, with your name and year on the back of your entry. We will not be working on these during class time so please encourage tamariki to try their best with entries in their free time. Winners will be announced on the 1st of September, and they will then attend the workshop (at school) in the afternoon of the 10th of September.

The criteria for entries is:

- -Originality (No A.I. assistance, must be from your imagination, not an existing book/movie/cartoon character)
- -Creativity (add interesting details to make your character unique)
- -Presentation (must be neat, clear to see and on the A4 card supplied)
- -Materials (on A4 card supplied, students can use any materials from home but cannot request use of school art supplies. Pictures can be drawn, sketched, painted, whatever format students choose)
- -Effort (use colours, lines, positioning, shading and other art techniques to make your character stand out)
- -Only open to current Owhango School students.

Some students asked if they had to write about/explain their characters. This is not necessary as we are focused on the art rather than writing.
